

Mother Mary: Icon of the Indwelling Holy Spirit in the Contemplative Church

As well as sessions on icons and their use in the church, the majority of Convocation 2019's educational sessions were on the topics of Mother Mary, Jesus and all of us. Mary Altalo+ led us in four sessions, during which she shared much information, including the following topics.

- -Mother Mary is an icon of trinitarian love the trinity cannot be separated.
- -Mother Mary is a model of the way to union with God.
- -Mother Mary teaches us the way of the mystics, the contemplatives.
- -Mother Mary reveals the mysteries, energy, fruits and fire of the Holy Spirit.
- -Mother Mary is the epiphany of spirituality in both the tradition and the experience of the church.
- -Mother Mary is a model of compassion and non-violence.
- -Mother Mary is a personal icon of the church: the movement of love and adoration.
- -Mother Mary is the dawn of the Mysterious Day: the Holy Spirit revealing of last things.
- -Mother Mary is the Safekeeper of the Eschatological JOY of the church.
- -Jesus brought God's Kingdom and unveils the end times.
- -Jesus shifted the social paradigm to non-violent resistance.
- -We are each one individual facet of the Divine image and we each have our own perspective on truth.

Essential questions from the Gospels"

Who do you say I am?

Do you understand what I am doing?

Do you understand what I must do?

Do you understand what you must do?

Do you understand who you are?

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New Intercommunion Agreement

In January of 2019, Bishop Michael and I had the honor of ordaining Kenneth von Folmar to the historic episcopacy on behalf of the Anthem Network, since renamed the Convergent Christian Communion. The Convergent Christian Communion sees itself as a place of convergence for Christian Tradition---a church that is evangelical, sacramental, and charismatic, with all three streams converging, not in confusion, but in unity, with no one stream overtaking the other. Bishop Kenneth serves the Communion as Presiding Bishop and is also based in Phoenix.

Both Bishop Michael and I have had the opportunity to participate in several ecumenical services with the CCC, both at Dignity and at one of the local ELCA parishes. As the Convergent Christian Communion started to grow nationwide, they identified the need to ordain two additional regionary bishops. Bishop Michael and I were honored to serve as co-ordaining bishops during the Communion's Convocation the weekend of February 15/16, 2020.

As a result of our connection through Bishop Kenneth's ordination and through our subsequent work together, it became clear that the Catholic Apostolic Church of Antioch and the Convergent Christian Communion both embraced all the essentials of the Catholic Christian tradition and met the criteria for formal intercommunion as outlined in the Bonn Agreement. Consequently, a formal intercommunion agreement was signed on Sunday, February 16, 2020, during the Mass of Consecration for the new regionary bishops.

Why the CCOA is Right for St. John's Ron Catherson+

For a while I recognized that I was being called to the ministry of priesthood. This calling was revealed to me by many events and friends within my life. The Independent Catholic jurisdiction I was in was not the right place for me; I had to find another jurisdiction.

Where does one look? The internet of course! I searched and searched and was not able to find a jurisdiction that would fit my ministry and my life. This was very discouraging, but I knew that God would not call anyone to a ministry if there were no way to fulfill it. I just had to keep looking.

Talking with an artist friend who recognized my calling led me to another female artist who wears a clergy collar. I searched the internet with this artist's name and found her web site. One of the pages talked about her ordination to the priesthood with the Catholic Apostolic Church of Antioch. And, lo and behold (remember the importance of the word behold?) she had a link to their web site. Click ... review ... looks interesting. I sent the link to the web site to a mentor friend (the late Deacon Scavone) who was living in Georgia at the time. I wanted his take – his approval – on this church.

After his approval, I sent an email to the presiding bishop and received a reply! The web site was still active. The presiding bishop was in Mexico and would call me when he returned home. A few days later, the home phone rang and after a long conversation I was a seminary student in the Sophia Divinity School. Five and half years later, I was able to practice my ministry as a priest.

However, St. John's Catholic Church of Antioch was active before I was ordained into the priesthood. The time I was in seminary was spent developing my ministry into a full church. The material goods, people, procedures, policies, and whatever was needed to be a church in the Las Cruces community were accumulated. When I was ordained as a deacon, we found a worship place and began holding Communion Services every Sunday. Also, the other duties that may be preformed by a Deacon such as baptisms and weddings were conducted. Once I was ordained to the priesthood, then all sacraments and duties given to me were then exercised.

My ministry is not just within St. John's Catholic Church of Antioch. It includes participating in interfaith groups and events, supporting the refugees, and those in need in the local community and in the world. St. John's is governed by a Parish Council which creates the policies and procedures as well as a budget for the monies given to the church. The Council continues to be aware of the needs of not only the church, but also the local and worldwide needs. St. John's is an active and forward-thinking ministry which I am honored to serve as priest.

My Ministry

My Ministry. I am a chaplain at the local hospital which service 17 counties and is an acute care not-for-profit hospital in central southern North Carolina. I serve both patients and staff. We have 395 bed capacity. We also have a 22-unit Rehabilitation center, a 30-unit Behavioral Health center and a major hub for other health facilities. We average 4200 employees. Our more severe patients are air-lifted to Duke University (about an hour trip) and many families request prayers/blessings prior to flight. I am "on call" most weekends and holidays. I lead two prayer services on the fourth Sunday of the month and I am part of the Crisis Team. As most chaplains will testify, my "job" is compassionate and creative listening. On Mondays I minister to the Behavioral Health unit and facilitate two groups on Spirituality and Spiritual self-care. During these group meeting at least one CPE (Clinical Pastoral Care Education) student is shadowing me.

How I found CCOA. My "chuch" had forbidden me to bring my autistic son to services. My belief system tells me that any church who does not welcome all children and infirmed individuals to its "table" is not a church where I want to be a member. So, I went church (denomination) surfing. One week my husband, a non-church subscriber, read a newspaper article announcing a new church to the area. He said he thought I might want to try it.

The reason I decided CCOA was for me. My nature is to study and evaluate new things, and to make an informed decision. Although there were a couple of major (local) hiccups in my discernment, the Doctrine of Love and my interaction with the primary church leadership convinced me that I had found my church home. I have stayed throughout the years because COA still claims the doctrine of love as its Principle and because it professes most closely the core of my ministry. To my delight when I met some of the church leaders, I was convinced CCOA was Home. God calls me to "Comfort His People". And I find that comforting people means meeting them where they are, not where I am.

Our business is to bring life, hope, and reality to men and women who are trying to find a way out of the jungle....the frightened, the confused, the hurting, the shell-shocked, the betrayed.
